THE VISION

Why 1,000 Marches to the Polls

This is a call to the table of democracy — everyone belongs there, and every seat matters. We are not asking you to vote for anyone. We are asking you to vote for something. This is a vision voting movement — you hold the vision; the ballot is one of the instruments.

“The ballot is where a vision becomes a mandate — or where its absence becomes permission. We vote for something, and we go together to do it.



The fight is in the states.

Governors, state legislators, and members of Congress hold the real power over the vote. For these 100 days, we shift every resource from the national stage to state and local ground. State power is not a lesser fight. **It is the fight.**

2 GET ORGANIZED – FOUR STEPS

Planning Your March

One thousand marches is a movement vote — we flood the zone. Not one big march in one place, but marches everywhere, on every early voting day.

Marching solo? That's still a march. A single march on the first day of early voting — with a Lead Organizer, two marshals, a Spokesperson — is a declaration that everyone's vote matters.



Step 1. Build your team

- **Organizing committee** — 3 to 10 people making your march a success
- **Marshals** — keep everyone cared for, supported, and safe along the route
- **Transportation leads** — plan your caravan and your parking



Step 2. Plan your logistics

Find a meetup spot less than half a mile from your polling place, with parking available. Your march can be a walk or a car caravan.



Step 3. Tell the press and social media

- Send out a press release; call local radio, TV, and newspapers
- Get commitments from reporters to cover your march
- Post on your own social media and community groups



Step 4. Know your polling place law

Call your county board of elections and get these answers **in writing**:

- ☐ **Electioneering buffer** — how far from the door is the line where our group stops?
- ☐ **Vehicle drop-off & accessible entrance** — for the elder, the walker, the wheelchair.
- ☐ **Site hours & permit** — including weekends; do we need notice to walk as a group?
